Maria José provided the following announcements: Highlighted the National Association of Counties (NACo) Health Award received by the CHW program Announced that the CHW program will be receiving the American Public Health Association (APHA) CHW Team of the Year Award this November 3rd in Washington D.C. 	
Photovocie	Maria José presented on the Photovoice Project in	
Project	Elkridge (Census Tract 6011.07).	
Presentation and Group Activity	 Photovoice combines photography and storytelling to highlight community strengths, challenges, and lived experiences. Project goals: facilitate community discussions, document assets and needs, and inform decision-makers. Methods included safety/ethical protocols, use of the SHOWED (See, Happening, Our, Why, Educate, Do) methodology, and categorizing assets (healthcare, schools, food access, green space, transportation, etc.). Over 600 images were captured and narrowed for analysis. Public exhibition scheduled for November 3, 2025, at the Elkridge Library. Because of the award schedule for the same date, the new date will be announced. Members will receive a "Save the Date" invitation. Maria José iterated that the Photovoice Project was conducted as part of the larger Community Asset Profile (CAP) Project. Used Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) to identify six priority census tracts. 	

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- Assets are categorized into six domains: emergency services, social/cultural organizations, government, education, healthcare, and neighborhood resources.
- Asset mapping activities included direct engagement (door-to-door outreach, conversations with community members).
- Future updates will connect asset mapping to advocacy efforts.

Maria José then led the collaborative through a group activity analyzing images with the SHOWED Method.

- Members engaged in small-group exercises analyzing selected community images using SHOWED prompts ("What do you see here?", "What is really happening?", "How does this relate to our lives?", "Why does this problem/strength exist?", "What can we do about it?").
- Some of the findings discussed included:
 - Farmers Market: highlighted food access, affordability, and partnership opportunities.
 - Playground with broken glass: identified safety hazards and lack of maintenance; suggested advocacy, community cleanups, and improved infrastructure.
- Feedback from activity will be informed of final selections for the November exhibition.

Continued Education for CHWs

During the June CHW LC meeting members expressed interest in a singular access point for CHW training options, Ashton shared the following:

- Maryland Department of Health (MDH) hosts a statewide CHW training list via their website
- HCLHIC staff are working on getting Howard County-specific training included on the MDH list.
