About the LCB Equity Committee

In 2018, the LCB convened an Equity Committee to develop a baseline report to tell the story of opportunity, across race, ethnicity and income levels in Howard County.

This report will be used to draw public and agency attention to the equity and opportunity gaps in Howard County.

Purpose of *Making the Case for Equity*

- The report represents a commitment from partners across multiple sectors to closely examine data, policies, and practices that result in inequities for children and families in Howard County.
- Making the Case for Equity highlights inequities that often go unseen as a result of Howard County's overall affluence and success.
- It is intended to catalyze conversations about equity and opportunity in Howard County and to support ongoing efforts to address inequitable outcomes for young people and families.



Findings From Community Conversations: Barriers

- Financial Challenges: lack of affordable housing/high cost of rent, shortage of relief/assistance unless one is very poor, perception that the county is for wealthy families
- Access to Transportation/Technology: limited public transportation, challenges regarding at-home internet access and personal computing
- Limited Access to Programs: cost, availability, and location of afterschool, summer, and other enrichment programs for young people limit accessibility

Findings From Community Conversations: Potential Solutions

- Affordable Support Programs and Resources For Youth and Families
- Greater Inclusivity and Support for Communities with Diverse Languages and Cultures
- Improved Public Transportation

By the Numbers: Inequitable Outcomes for Youth and Families

By the Numbers: Report Measures

Making the Case for Equity presents data that align with desired outcomes that the Local Children's Board has identified as priorities, both for its efforts focused specifically on equity and for its broader work.

- Families Have Access to Opportunity
- Youth Will Succeed in School
- Youth Will Make Healthy Choices
- Youth Will Succeed in Life

By the Numbers: Example Findings

- Youth of color in Howard County, are more likely than their white peers to experience negative outcomes and less likely to benefit from opportunities.
- Relative to white youth in Howard County, Black/African American youth are more than 5.75 times more likely to be suspended from school.
- Hispanic/Latino youth are 3.24 times more likely than white youth to live in poverty.






Percentage of Families Living at or Below ALICE Threshold (2014)



*ALICE stands for asset-limited and income constrained (despite being employed). To live at the ALICE threshold in Howard County, a family of four must make at least \$75,000 a year.



Percentage of Total Suspensions/ Expulsions, by Race (2016-17)




By the Numbers: Youth Will Make Healthy Choices

Percentage of Students Who Ever Made a Plan About How They Would Kill Themselves, Middle School, by Race (2016)





Percentage of Students Who Ever Tried to Kill Themselves, by Race-Middle School (2016)




