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
Who regulates cannabis in Maryland?

In 2023, MCA became an independent agency that provide services to patients, adult consumers, providers, caregivers, and Maryland businesses.

Maryland Cannabis Administration (MCA)

oversees all licensing, registration, inspection, and testing measures pertaining to Maryland's medical and adult-use cannabis program.

Maryland's medical program began in 2017 and currently has about 115,000 certified medical patients.





BACKGROUND ON LEGALIZATION IN MARYLAND



Adult-use Cannabis Legalization





- Maryland voters passed a referendum legalizing cannabis for personal use for adults 21+ as of 7/1/23. Cannabis can only be sold in licensed dispensaries with valid ID.
- Dispensaries sell both medical + adult-use cannabis.
- The Cannabis Reform Act (CRA) (2023 HB556/SB516) established a framework for legal sales.
- CRA advances social equity through new cannabis business licensing opportunities and community reinvestment goals to assist communities impacted by cannabis criminalization.

Adult-use Cannabis Legalization






- Cannabis can't be smoked in public spaces (streets, sidewalks, parks, moving cars).
- Employers and landlords can have stricter cannabis-related policies.
- It remains illegal to drive under the influence of cannabis.
- Cannabis remains illegal under federal law, and you may not carry or transport cannabis over state lines. It's illegal to send cannabis through the US mail.




Adult-Use Possession Limits

Establishes "Personal use amount" of:







Home Grow

Allows for up to **two** plants to be grown per residence, inside and out of public view.

Medical Patients allowed <u>four plants to be grown per residence</u>, inside and out of public view.

Note: Edibles sold on the Adult-Use market may not exceed 10 mg THC per unit and 100 mg THC per package.



Protections in place to reduce youth use

The Cannabis Reform Act (CRA) and regulations include promising and best practices to reduce youth access and appeal.

- Advertising restrictions prohibits youth appealing ads; billboards (except on licensed premises); sponsorships; giveaways; samples; coupons; and TV, radio, internet, or print ads (unless ≥85% of the audience is 21+); requires age gating for websites.
- **Point-of-sale controls** requires age verification, retailer education, limited hours of operation.
- **Product controls** requires edible products only in geometric shapes; prohibits youth-appealing shapes (resembling candy, animals, etc.).

I CAN ONLY BUY IT

IF I'M 21+?

Yes. Like tobacco and alcohol, the legal purchase age for adult-use cannabis in Maryland is 21 or older. A valid, government ID (driver's license or state-issued ID card, passport/passport card, military ID, tribal card) is required at the point of sale. Legal purchase and possession limits for personal use of cannabis include up to 1.5 ounces of cannabis flower (including joints and pre-rolls), 12 grams of concentrated cannabis (vape products), or a total amount of edible cannabis products that does not exceed 750 milligrams THC.

Protections in place to reduce youth use

The Cannabis Reform Act (CRA) and emergency regulations include promising and best practices to reduce youth access and appeal.

- Packaging, labeling, product limits prohibits youth-appealing imagery (e.g. cartoons, candy) on packaging; potency caps; mandates specific warning and informational labels, including THC symbol
- Zoning limits retail density, especially near youth-serving locations
- Price regulations sets 9% sales and use tax (same as alcohol tax)
- Smoke-free policies including school policies (tobacco, vape, cannabis)
- Family, school, and community-based education



Regulatory Updates

- Emergency regulations took effect July 1, 2023, largely mirroring existing Maryland Medical Cannabis Commission's (MMCC) regulations for many requirements that didn't change with adult-use legalization.
- Permanent regulations took effect in June 2024 that clarify, update, and improve regulatory language where needed.
- Summary of changes:
 - · Curbside pick-up and drive-through dispensing options allowable for all consumers.
 - 12-hour limit/hours of operation removed and allowable hours extended by one hour to 11pm.
 - Adult-use consumers may purchase concentrated products not to exceed 1 gram weight.
 - Establish requirements for micro dispensaries to govern transport and storage.


Drugged Driving - Take it seriously. Respect the effect.

Driving even a little high can wreck you.



Cannabis and driving don't mix! Being even a little high behind the wheel can wreck you-protect yourself and others on the road.





How does cannabis influence my driving?

Cannabis affects areas of the brain that control balance, coordination, memory, and judgment. On the road, this can result in slower reaction time, decreased ability to concentrate and make decisions, and reduced awareness of time and distance, which are critical for safe and alert driving.

How long should I wait to drive after using cannabis?

Research suggests waiting six hours after using cannabis before driving. However, effects from edibles can be delayed, and last up to 12 hours. If you've mixed cannabis with other substances like alcohol, plan to wait even longer before driving. Remember—if you feel different, you drive different.

Can I get a DUI?

Yes. Using cannabis while driving (by a driver or passenger) and driving under the influence of cannabis is against the law. If you are impaired while driving, you can get a DUI – even as a certified patient with a medical card.




Drugged Driving Campaign Rollout

Ads started on "4/20" through 6/30 with placement on billboards, social media, TV/ streaming, buses, and bar media.

Core messages and call to action:

- Consuming cannabis before or while driving is unsafe and illegal
- Even small amounts of cannabis can affect coordination and delay splitsecond decision-making
- Effects of edibles can be delayed and long-lasting
- Protect yourself and others by planning a safe and sober ride

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Where can I smoke cannabis?

Generally speaking, it's legal to smoke cannabis in private homes and on private property. However, if you rent or live in an HOA, additional restrictions may apply. Check your rental or HOA agreement.

Where can't I smoke cannabis?

Smoking cannabis is not permitted in indoor and outdoor public spaces. That means parks and playgrounds, streets and sidewalks, bars and restaurants, moving cars* and public transportation (buses, vans, trains, cabs, limousines).

*Smoking in moving cars is a safety risk and exposes other occupants to secondhand smoke odor and chemicals.

What else do I need to know?

Smoking cannabis in public spaces can expose others—including children—to secondhand smoke. Plus, not everyone enjoys the smell. By respecting smoke-free spaces and the preferences of others, you can help contribute to a positive cannabis culture within your community.



Smoke-free public and outdoor spaces

Ads identify outdoor and public places where smoking is not permitted and emphasize everyone's role in protecting the vibrancy of Maryland's public and outdoor spaces. Beach/boardwalk, billboards, transit, TV, social media, bars/restaurants, festivals/special

events (stadiums, concert venues).















Safe Storage Campaign

Ads informed by partnership with Maryland Poison Center. Messages identify common scenarios where accidental ingestion can happen (cannabis left out on counter, placed in fridge, stored in a purse). More PSAs and ad content is planned for fall 2024.

Core messages and call to action:

- Like medicines, alcohol, or cleaning products, cannabis can be toxic to children and pets.
- Store cannabis up, away, and out of sight. Lock it up if possible.


